PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

CCTV: Following instances of vandalism and anti-social behaviour in the vicinity of the King's Sutton Millennium Memorial Hall and the Rec, the Parish Council are currently considering installing a CCTV surveillance system. It is to be hoped that this will deter future incidents

PLANNING: The Parish Council was recently asked to comment on a new Strategic Plan for the area issued by West Northamptonshire Council; this will replace the West Northamptonshire Joint Core Strategy and will cover the period up to 2050.

It was resolved to respond to the following question:

What approach do you think the WNSP should take to development in the rural areas, in particular the level of growth that may be appropriate and where that growth could be best accommodated?

The Parish Council's response:

- Growth should not, as has been suggested by some, be calculated based on historic growth. That would mean those who have taken the pain to date, would be expected to take even more pain in future.
- Growth should be allowed outside of agreed village confines only in very exceptional cases .This should be strictly adhered to so as to preserve the rural nature of the villages and to ensure that whatever is allowed by way of expansion, is environmentally sound.

 Any growth as is permitted, should primarily be geared up to meet village requirements in terms of true affordability and house size, rather than the aspirations of wealthy incomers or the profitability of developers. For example, smaller starter homes should be prioritised over larger 3/4/5 bedroom houses.

Library in the Bus Shelter

The library in the Parish Council Bus Shelter is well used and beautifully maintained and has been really positively received as an asset to the village during the pandemic. Concerns were raised last year about the books becoming damp over the winter but this did not seem to cause an issue. The Parish Council would like to remind everyone to sanitise their hands before and after touching the books in order to minimise risks of infection transmission. We would also remind people that it is not acceptable to urinate behind the bus shelter and then access the library for obvious reasons.

We are interested to know whether you would like this facility to continue in the bus shelter or would prefer to see it re-located back into the church where it was previously.

Neighbourhood Watch

We have seen a big drop in crime in the past couple months which is great, however we are seeing a lot of antisocial behaviour issues on the Rec and around the Millennium Hall.

We had vandalism to play equipment on the 'rec' where allegedly some children from our village used red spray paint to deface play equipment and a bench.

There have also been numerous instances where children have been banging on the windows of the businesses operating in the Millennium Hall and disturbing and sometimes scaring elderly patients/customers.

We can all agree that none of us want this happening in our village and I'm certain that we can work together to educate the youngsters involved in the trouble (we have all been young and acted badly).

That being said, it leads me to some fantastic news which I can now formally confirm, the Millennium Hall will be having a security camera system installed, hopefully before Christmas, it will protect the hall and the village rec.

2022 can be an amazing year if we continue to pull together as a community.

Road Closure

Plans to close the back road from King's Sutton to Middleton Cheney and Banbury for structural repairs to the bridge over Farthinghoe stream have been put back to next month.

Closure will now start on December 6, but the road will be re-opened temporarily on December 24 to allow traffic during the Christmas/New Year period.

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Rectory Homes Update

Representatives of Rectory Homes and Glanville, their flooding consultants met representatives of the Kings Sutton Parish Council on 4th November.

The main purpose of the meeting was to update the Council on further work done on planning for flood prevention in the new Hampton Drive planning proposal which is currently being prepared for submission to West Northamptonshire Council.

Rectory Homes had been given more background on current flooding problems in the area by residents and Parish Councillors at the drop-in meeting held in August. It had also been made aware that in the survey of residents carried out by the Council, 80% had been against more development in the village and 75% of those had expressed concern that the proposal would create further flooding problems.

The main amendments made to the original draft Rectory proposals are to:

- Change the wild life pond in the north of the site into an attenuation pond into which they will direct any 'exceedings' (flood water) to reduce pressure on the Hampton Drive / Windsor Close outlet into the drain there.
- Install a major new ditch along the north and east of the site.
- Divert some of those 'exceedings' towards the Banbury Lane culvert from the pond. Rectory and Glanville say that this will be done in a controlled way as to ensure that the capacity of the Banbury Lane culvert is not overrun.

 Enlarge and re-design the planned southern attenuation pond.

The plan opposite gives further details.

The Parish Council will wait until the final application is submitted before commenting on the issues. However, as no members of the Parish Council are drainage experts, it will have to rely on West Northamptonshire Council's flooding specialists to make a thorough investigation into the efficacy of the flooding proposals.

For that reason, and because of the complications and sensitivities of the issue, the Parish Council has alerted our Unitary Councillor Breese, that it will be relying on the technical skills of the West Northants Planning Department to examine the scheme thoroughly. It has however also offered to meet with those who will have the job of reviewing the scheme at West Northants, to give them a feel for the important issues and a history of the site and its immediate surroundings.

Rectory Homes confirmed that it will provide final copies of its drainage plans when they are completed. They are now planning to lodge the outline planning application at the end of November or the beginning of December.

They have also confirmed that they are still working towards answering the Parish Council's questions previously submitted in August which they hope to do at the same time at the planning application submission.

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Footpath Lighting

As the nights are drawing in, footpath lighting once again becomes more relevant to more parishioners. The Parish Council are responsible for footpath lighting in the village and are reviewing ways to upgrade the lighting in the village with a view to becoming greener as well as saving on energy and maintenance costs.

To this effect the Council is conducting a trial on a new LED lamp which is located in Glebe Rise (outside number 9). This lamp has the advantage of directing the light downwards reducing light pollution as well as being able to be reduced to 50% from 10pm. The Parish Council would welcome your feedback on this, please email Liz Hart on clerk@kingssuttonpc.org.uk

We are also in the process of obtaining quotations to upgrade the Windsor lamps to LED and replacement of the glazing in these lamps. Any faults with these lights should be reported to the Parish Clerk, Liz Hart via email on clerk@kingssuttonpc.org.uk

We would also like to call on residents to ensure that trees on their boundary are not blocking the lights. A number of trees are causing a problem and we request that the property owners prune these so as to ensure the footpaths are adequately lit.

Primary School

We have had a good start to the year at King's Sutton Primary Academy. In September we welcomed 22 new children into our Reception class and it has been lovely getting to know them and their families.

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
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ADULT TENNIS COACHING

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

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Grant opportunities for village groups and organisations

The Parish Council would like to advise village groups and organisations of the following two funding streams available to them:

Community Funding Grants – West Northamptonshire Council

WNC supports local community and voluntary groups with grant awards to help them deliver important services and activities to communities.

There are three funding streams:

- Direct Grants: made to the voluntary and community sector to fund key services, including infrastructure support, money and debt advice and community transport. These services are funded either by large grant awards or as commissioned services.
- Councillor Covid Support Fund 2021-22: funds are allocated to Councillors to allocate money within their ward to make a positive impact on the areas they represent and to empower local residents to be active in their communities' recovery from the impact of Covid.
- Community Funding Grants: grants made to local community and voluntary groups to enable them to deliver important services and activities to our communities.

The Council's Community Funding Grant Policy (https://www.westnorthants.gov. uk/community-safety-and-emergencies/community-funding-grant-policy) sets out the principles and criteria that govern how Community Funding Grants are awarded, who can apply for a Community Funding Grant, and what can and cannot be funded.

Community Funding Grants are capped at £15,000 and £5,000. The initial funding round, within each financial year, will be open to all applications seeking a Community Funding Grant up to the value of £15,000. All subsequent funding rounds, within the financial year, will be capped to projects / services where the total value of the Community Funding Grant requested is up to the value of £5,000. Community Grants – King's Sutton Parish Council

There is approximately £20,000 in total available from the Parish Council for grants or expenditure, mostly under the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) scheme. The money can only be used for projects which: "support the development of the parish council's area by funding the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development has placed on the area."

Further Government information confirms that it may be used to "fund facilities such as play areas, parks and green spaces, cultural and sports facilities.". The inclusion of 'cultural and sports facilities' widens the possible areas of spending to enable local organisations to apply. Local organisations are invited to make applications for consideration by the Parish Council during January 2022.

The following principles apply:

- Organisations must operate within the village and be of benefit to as many village residents as possible.
- Projects must be able to fit either the 'infrastructure' or 'cultural or sports facility' conditions listed above.
- No individual organisation will be granted more than £4,000.
- The projects involved should normally be of a capital nature and therefore provide long term benefit.
- Written submissions should be made to the Parish Clerk by the closing date of 31 December 2021 and should demonstrate how the project fits the definitions listed above.

Organisations must submit:

- a copy of their latest annual accounts
- the application form (obtainable from the Parish Clerk: clerk@kingssuttonpc.org.uk)

If successful in their application organisations must:

- produce invoices for money spent
- provide a full written report completion of the project

The Parish Council looks forward to receiving your applications.

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Do you care for someone?



Northamptonshire Carers are here to support those who care for a loved one with a disability, long-term physical or mental health condition. Many don't immediately identify themselves as a Carer even though they may be someone of any age who cares for a relative, friend or neighbour who has additional needs and doesn't do this as part of any regular paid employment.

We are aware Carers who live in rural communities such as King's Sutton are especially disadvantaged as they are often isolated from more centrally based services. There are still many 'hidden' Carers which we are endeavouring to reach and of course we support unpaid Carers across the whole of Northamptonshire too.

We do this by offering Carers Drop-in Sessions, Support Groups, One-off events, access to our Telephone Support Line and much more. Groups are now meeting again in person as we get back to the 'new normal' but like everyone during the COV-ID-19 pandemic, we have adapted our services and are very proud to have continued supporting Carers successfully through regular phone calls, WhatsApp groups and Zoom get-togethers until our usual groups could re-start. We are always looking to expand our services and so have arranged for two staff members from Northamptonshire Carers to be in King's Sutton on

Friday 10th Dec between 10am-12 at the Memorial Millennium Hall during the regular Coffee Morning. It would be lovely to see lots of Carers there. Carers and their Cared For are both welcome.

So if you feel there is a need to open a new standalone support group in your area on a more regular basis, or would like to see us at the Coffee Morning on a monthly basis, do come along that day or let us know via email. Evidence shows that these sessions not only benefit the Carers themselves but also help local communities become more resilient.

To successfully run these groups at a local level we rely on the help of the many kind ambassadors who we refer to as our 'Carer Champions.' If you know someone or are yourself willing to assist in some small way, either by promoting our services in your village or helping us at Carers drop-in sessions please do approach us or forward your details on to Northamptonshire Carers.

We provide training and lots of support and a recent quote from an existing Carer Champion said 'Volunteering with Northamptonshire Carers is a truly humbling experience which has given me much more than I contribute.' So it is heart-warming to hear that they get as much reward from their volunteering role as they give back. King's Sutton saddlers

The accidental discovery on the internet of a photograph of a small brass plate reading "Cadd, Maker, Kings Sutton" has thrown unexpected light on the history of No 1. Red Lion Street which has been known for many years as 'Saddlers'. We now know that it was indeed lived in as a house and business by families of saddlers and harness makers from at least the 1840s until 1935.

Saddle and harness making was one of those essential rural crafts without which rural communities would have found it difficult to function. Horses were an essential part of Victorian life and the working horse was the chief means of motive power on most farms. It has been estimated that here were around 3.3 million horses in late Victorian Britain. In the country horses were needed for all sorts of functions, but principally for a wide range of agricultural activities including ploughing, harrowing and the carting of crops. They were also needed by carters who collected and delivered goods between villages and the nearby towns where there were markets. And at the upper end of the social scale saddle horses were required by the middle classes and gentry to travel around at their convenience, singly or by carriage, or indeed, to indulge in fox hunting.

In rural villages like King's Sutton most of the demand would have been for making and repairing harnesses for working horses. By no means every village had a saddler and harness maker, but in west Northamptonshire from the end of the eighteenth century

there are records of saddlers in Middleton Cheney and in King's Sutton. In the 1890s the nearest saddlers and harness makers to King's Sutton were at Middleton Cheney, Adderbury, Bloxham and Deddington. Saddlers in Northamptonshire were further away at Brackley and beyond. It is more likely that customers wanting to buy or order a new saddle would go to Banbury where there would be more choice. More than a dozen firms of saddlers are recorded in Rusher's Banbury Directory between 1832 and 1906.

The Cadd family were not the first saddlers recorded in Red Lion Street as Samuel Taylor, who was born in King's Sutton in 1819, appears there in the 1841 Census as a saddler & harness maker. Interestingly when his twins were baptized in 1844 the vicar noted his occupation in the register more specifically as that of 'collar maker'. The construction of the collar was a very important part of a heavy horse harness to which the traces from the plough or cart were attached. Samuel had three boys and two of them became saddlers themselves but they moved away to Oakham in Rutland and Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire. The last we see of Samuel was in 1901 when he was retired and living with a grandson, himself the manager of a saddlery, in Oakham. He retired sometime before 1891 because by then the house in Red Lion Street was occupied by David Cadd and his family.

David Cadd was born in Hinton in the Hedges to a labourer's family in 1861. He must have been apprenticed at some point to a saddler and is found in 1881. aged 20 as an assistant to the foreman of a saddler's shop in Stow on the Wold owned by the widow of Henry Sedgeley, a saddler who had died in 1874. Cadd ran his own business in Red Lion Street until he retired in 1933, when, as the Banbury Advertiser noted at the time: "An old established business which has been in existence for a great many years has been closed down. Mr. David Cadd who took over the business of a saddler and harness maker over 40 years ago, decided, owing to ill-health, to close down the business as from Friday last. As this is the only business of its kind in the village some inconvenience will be caused to the local farmers and others". (Banbury Advertiser, 6 July 1933). In 1901 a "journeyman saddler", John Thomas Adkins or Atkins, was living with his parents in Dobbin Street (now Richmond Street) - but whether he worked for David Cadd, and whether there was enough trade for two saddlers in the village we cannot tell. However, in 1910 he married Ellen Twynham of King's Sutton and they moved to North Road, Grimsbury, where he was still resident in 1939.

By the mid-1930s the number of horses used in agriculture had decreased substantially from its peak in the Victorian era, and it is not surprising that there was no saddler wishing to take over Cadd's business. Horse numbers are very difficult to quantify

but government information reveals that the number of horses on agricultural holdings in 1900 amounted to some 1.3 million; by 1925 this had declined to 1.15 million; the trend was accelerating sharply - and after the Second World War in 1950 there were only 364,000 left). In these circumstances, of the aftermath of WWI, saddlery and harness making had inevitably become a declining, then dying, trade.

David Cadd also acted (from the early 1890s) as a local agent for Edward Atkins at Old Wharf, Banbury, who hired out sacks to farmers on a weekly basis, and was a stalwart of the village Horticultural Society and regularly participated in their shows. He had married Phoebe Edwards from Drayton, west of Banbury and had four children. His daughter, Ellen, married Vincent Tilbury, the eldest son of King's Sutton's long-serving headmaster Albert Tilbury who lived at Fernleigh in Whittall Street.

At the house in Red Lion Street the large window of the saddler's workshop facing on to the street is still very evident, with a large double entrance door on the end elevation. The building itself is probably dates from the seventeenth century, and the steep pitch of the roof is evidence that it was originally thatched – as were most houses in the village.

But what of David Cadd's nose plate? Terry Keegan notes that "most harness makers went out of their way to place a trade mark of some sort on their craftsmanship. On bridles in England

and Wales this was usually done by advertising their name and [locality] on a brass nose band plate". "The noseband plate which was attached by two threaded studs and nuts, with an internal leather cover to protect the horses' nose. These were often hinged, either in the centre or using two side hinges allowing for movement with the horse's breathing". (Saddlers Brasses NHBS) The Cadd plate is of the double hinged pattern and, as in most examples, the wording cast into the plate, is simply "Cadd - Maker -Kings Sutton". The word 'saddler' rarely appears on nose plates, maybe because the 'makers' were primarily harness makers and not saddlers.

Nose band plates were among the many items of saddlers' ironmongery required for the making of a horse harness, and for which Walsall outside Birmingham had been the major centre for decades. Indeed it had been mentioned as early as 1690 by Dr Plot in his pioneering Natural History of Staffordshire. It is very likely therefore that David Cadd ordered buckles, bridles, bits, brasses

and the other metal fittings he needed, as well as his nose plates, from Walsall. Keegan also notes that "as the [country] trade began to decline [in the twentieth century] ...many saddlers [and harness makers] looked to the traveller from Walsall to supply them with some of the heavier work connected with the making of the cart harness. [The harness makers would] send to Walsall for the collar body and even the complete cart saddle leaving only the collar covering and strap work to do."

David Cadd could well have placed his orders through fellow saddlers in Banbury who would be visited regularly by the commercial travellers from Walsall. It is suggested that the plate dates from the years immediately before the First World War.
