CHOCOLATE !!

I noticed that the shops had chocolate eggs on the shelves shortly after Christmas. This is the season for eating them, it seems – from January to Easter!! And there is nothing wrong with eating chocolate eggs – well, it depends a bit on how many!! But let us not kid ourselves that in eating eggs we are celebrating Easter! The connection is that with real eggs you have to break the shell to let out the new life, whether it be the new chick, or the yolk and white to eat. And this is something like Christ bursting out of the sealed tomb, risen to new and eternal life.

The heart of Easter is that Jesus, the man from Nazareth, who went about doing good, was arrested, tortured and crucified on a Friday in Jerusalem, about the year 30. That his dead body was placed in a tomb and the Jewish leaders asked for it to be sealed and guarded so that the body could not be stolen. But guards and seals do not stop God, and Christ was raised from death. Not returned to the life he had lived before, but to a new life. The Easter stories in the Gospels have several characteristics which try to emphasise this: he enters rooms where the doors are locked, he is unrecognized when people first see him, he vanishes from them, and finally, he leaves the earth to return to heaven.

This is what Christians believe and we don't believe it just because of the story handed down to us, but because this is the reality of our lives. Christ is risen. He is alive and we know and love him, and seek to follow his way of doing good.

Jesus showed his love for us at the Last Supper – a Passover celebration in which he gave us the meal which is his Body and Blood – his life given for us: so we celebrate Maundy Thursday - Maundy comes from the word mandatum – command, for Christ commands us to love one another.

We celebrate the Cross on Good Friday: a day which is good for us because through his death we are set free from sin and death; and we celebrate on Easter Day that the new life is there and for us to share. Come and share in these celebrations!

You may still join the Roll after 17th March, but you will not be able to take part in voting for PCC members at the Annual Church Meeting which will be held this year on Sunday 14th April after the 11am Sung Mass.

What is a Sabbatical?

Father Roger has announced that this year he is to take a sabbatical, so what is it?

The Archbishop's Council recommends that all Church of England ministers should get a three month sabbatical at least once every 10 years. Father Roger plans to start his sabbatical on 26^{th} August and will resume work again on 17^{th} November.

The word 'sabbatical' is derived from the same root as 'Sabbath'. This indicates that a fundamental purpose of a sabbatical is to have time for rest, renewal and re-creation so as to return refreshed in their ministry. It is generally envisaged that sabbaticals will include three elements:

- A holiday
- A course of study, learning or development and
- A Retreat.

Father Roger's plans for his almost three month break are not yet completely finalised but will almost certainly include a holiday. He says "I am planning some time for reflection and prayer - preparing for my last few years here. I shall be studying the "ressourcement" movement which goes back to the sources and tries to see both what was the original inspiration and then what that says to us today. Specifically I am looking at liturgy and architecture in the very early centuries and doing this in Spain and Italy".

Stations of the Cross.



If you have visited the church, you may have noticed that at regular intervals around the walls there are plaster relief pictures, each with a cross above and numbers below. These are known as the 'Stations of the Cross'. Other names for these include 'Way of the Cross', the 'Via Dolorosa' and in Latin: 'Via Crucis'. The pictures depict the final hours in the life of Jesus, from his trial to his burial. The earliest use of the word "stations" seems to have occurred around 1520, when a returning pilgrim to the Holy Land described pilgrims following the footsteps of Christ to the

Cross. During the 15th and 16th centuries the Franciscans began to build a series of outdoor shrines to duplicate their counterparts in Jerusalem.

There are fourteen stations:

1. Jesus is condemned to death
