One hundred years ago the nations of Europe went to war on a scale that was unprecedented. The shooting of an archduke in, what must have seemed to most British people, a far off place, Sarajevo, led to four years of terrible carnage.

Almost every community in these islands and across the whole of Europe and into much of the rest of the world has memorials for those who died. It was a time when humanity discovered how depraved and wicked it could be. The increasing uncertainties generated by the amazing scientific discoveries of the 19th century, together with social and political changes and the thought of people like Marx and Freud, gathered pace and led to the nihilistic systems of the 20th century – communism, fascism – and the horrors of modern warfare.

Now the latest "ism" unleashing brutality and violence comes from a militant form of Islam: driven by divisions within Islam and a fundamentalist reading of the Islamic traditions, which sees itself fundamentally at odds with the "West". Partly this antagonism is fed by the consumerist, materialist culture, but also by a rejection of Christian values. These values underpin Western society — and not just in the geographic west but in South America, in parts of Africa and Asia: values such as forgiveness, humility, gentleness, goodness, truth, and above all love. Love is at the heart of the Jewish ethic and Jesus moves that love of God and neighbour to a new, unprecedented level when he tells us to love our enemies.

It seems to me as we mark the centenary of the beginning of the First World War the urgent task for humanity is the building of peace. We have a vision of humanity living in prosperity and peace, a vision which Jesus and the Gospels call the kingdom of God. In this kingdom there is a community of brothers and sisters, caring with deep compassion, searching for justice for all. At its best Islam has much in common with this Christian vision.

I know people feel that they can do little in these great causes. But we can say to our politicians - let's build a society rooted in this compassionate love for actions of the West in the past. Being ourselves, as far as is possible in our circumstances, at peace with all. And the greatest weapon we have - is prayer. We need to stand urgently before God and his world to pray for the coming of the kingdom.

At the Parish church we are offering a time of words and music on the themes of war and peace. It isn't a service – there won't be prayers or hymns – but it will be an opportunity to reflect, and in the silence of our hearts to use our spiritual energies towards the making of peace. This is at 4pm on Sunday 3rd August. There will, of course, be our usual events in November - Sunday 9th at 10. 55am and Tuesday 11th at 11am.








The Parable of the Sower At King's Kids on the 10^{th} July the children listened to the story about the Sower. (Mt 13.18-23).
