

5.0.S. - Save Our Spire



First, many thanks to everyone who has expressed their support. I have received lots of letters and the number of signatures that we are collecting continues to mount. So you will be wondering what is happening to further our campaign.

We are making a bid for funds from Viridor Credits, who operate the landfill site at Ardley and give grants to people within the local community for heritage projects. The outcome of our application is expected mid-September. Depending on the outcome, then perhaps we will make an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Meanwhile, a group of people is approaching individuals in the community who might be prepared to donate. We are beginning to plan some events for next year, which will, we hope, include:

- A Dinner with Opera Cabaret
- A Sponsored Walk.
 (This will include parts of the parish boundary which are not ordinary footpaths).

- A Flower Festival (to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday)
- Jars in pubs (for loose change or even notes!)

All donations are, of course, very welcome. Cheques should be made payable to King's Sutton PCC and marked "The Spire". There are envelopes at the back of church, under the Tower, which you can use to Gift Aid your donation. And donations should come to the Vicarage – the house at the far end of Church Avenue. You might prefer to make your donation over a period of time. Arrangements for that can be made by contacting our treasurer – Dr. Douglas Hamilton (812810).

There is a display in church of photographs showing some of the problems with the spire: some instability of pinnacles and large areas of eroding stone.

MEDICALLY-ASSISTED SUICIDE

On September 11th, the Second Reading of the Assisted Dying Bill will take place in the House of Commons. This would allow a terminally ill adult in England and Wales to have a lethal prescription for self-administration, supervised by 'an attending health professional' (doctor or nurse). The key prerequisite is a *life expectancy of less than six months;* the patient does not have to be in physical or mental distress. The Bill is not about long-term progressive conditions such as MS or dementia. The main justification is the right to self-determination: people should have the right to choose the time and mode of their death. However, despite upsetting 'horror stories' palliative care does not (at least, should not) leave patients to suffer unbearably. The most appropriate response to horror stories is to increase the availability of specialist palliative care.

Although both sides in the argument claim compassion as a major motivation, palliative care and AD are essentially mutually exclusive philosophies. Palliative care is based on the belief that life has meaning and purpose up to the moment of death, whereas AD is essentially nihilistic. Expecting health professionals to deliver both is simply too much to ask. The common denominator in patients who desire to hasten death is despair – a sense of hopelessness, helplessness and lack of control. Often these people want to be heard, to express their frustrations and fears, to be understood.

The prognosis is often wildly inaccurate and there is the danger of coercion: both doctor-on-patient and family-on-doctor. In the UK the law at present provides a clear, bright line of allowing death to be natural. It may be occasionally crossed by doctors (and others) but it is unambiguous. It is better for hard cases to be taken care of by various expedients than to introduce new legislation which would become too permissive.
