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# Reformers (3)



Now for more on Martin Luther, one of those who not only wanted to clean up the church from its late mediaeval corruptions, but wanted to change the Church's teaching too, and thus, being excommunicated by the Pope, found himself having to establish what was all but a new church. This came to be named after him.

Martin Luther, born in 1483, was a clever boy and well educated at Erfurt University. One day he was riding his horse during a thunderstorm and was struck by lightning. Obviously he survived, but this incident deepened his Christian faith, and he decided to join the Augustinians as a friar. He continued his theological studies and received a Doctorate at Wittenberg in 1512. So, here we have him, a friar, priest, theologian, and musician; but then in 1517 he published his 95 theses. The story goes that these were nailed to a church door in Wittenberg, and they will show you the door, but this is actually an apocryphal story. They were actually printed and published that year. But these theses are seen as the first dramatic act of the Reformation. He set off a furious debate and in 1521 was excommunicated by Pope Leo X as a heretic and condemned and declared an outlaw at the Diet of Worms – an imperial assembly (Diet) of the Holy Roman Empire held in Worms, then an

Imperial Free City of the Empire. However, the local big-wig, Frederick III, gave him shelter in the castle at Wartburg, and there was much support for him in Wittenberg where he returned in 1522, remaining there till his death in 1546.

There were two fundamental issues for him. One was that the Bible was the only source of divine knowledge – over against the traditional view that reason and tradition also had a role to play. And secondly, that salvation was by faith alone. The Catholic teaching was that you showed your faith by your acts. Luther translated the Bible into German and in German culture that is the most important factor in the development of the modern language. He also denied the need for priests, although many Lutheran churches did continue with bishops and priests. Clerical marriage was also allowed and indeed Martin married a girl called Katharine. She was 26, he was 41!

Other important things Luther did included writing a reformed Liturgy in German, a Catechism and encouraging congregational singing by writing some of the first chorale-type hymns. At the time there was some influence upon the Church here, and there are a handful of Lutheran Churches in the UK - mainly ex-pat German communities. However, Lutheranism spread into Scandinavia and the Church of England is in communion with those churches.

# LENT COURSE:

# LIVING AN AUTHENTIC LIFE

During Lent, a course entitled 'Living an Authentic Life' – which has been created by USPG, will run in the Parish on Tuesdays at 10am in the Church Room, (after the 9.30am service), and will be repeated on Wednesdays at 7.45pm at 5 Green Lane, Charlton. The course starts on  $7^{th}/8^{th}$  March, and will consist of five sessions. Its aim is to explore what it means to be a disciple of Christ today, looking at Bible passages and reading about experiences of Christians around the world. The five parts of the study are:

- 1. Introducing discipleship;
- 2. How shall we live?
- 3. Living with difference;
- 4. A world of injustice;
- 5. Counting the cost.


