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## CONTEMPORARY REFORM MOVEMENTS

I have been writing about the Reformation because this is the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Luther's challenge to the Catholic Church. But the Church is constantly in need of reform and renewal, and there are several movements in our own day which are seeking to do this.

First, in the Church of England: there are movements to renew the structures of the Church, and Archbishop Justin sees prayer at the heart of all this and so has established an ecumenical community living at Lambeth Palace. Also at the Palace a new library is to be built. More of that when the buildings are up and running - not till 2020!

"Fresh Expressions" is another movement for renewal - finding ways of being church that are open and welcoming for people with little understanding of the faith. However, these have been criticised for lacking teaching and any elements of what Christians recognize as worship. They do make links with people on the edges and that must be good.

Then, ecumenically: that whole movement for seeking Christian Unity finds us working together with our Catholic and Baptist friends. We look forward to welcoming the new Baptist pastor, the Reverend Ian McDonald, and our long established relationship with the Catholics has grown considerably in recent years.



Linked to that, has been a wider renewal led by recent Popes. S John Paul II was an heroic figure and by his travels and charisma helped many to find new faith. Benedict XVI, a very different man, a theologian, whose writings will continue to resonate for generations to come, asked profound questions: about the nature of God, of how we can renew

faith in the heartlands of Christian Europe. Currently there is Francis, with his emphasis on the poor and the mercy of God, as he also seeks to reform the Curia in Rome.

For all Christian people there is a need for personal reform and renewal. We know that by God's grace we could be stronger in faith, have a greater hope and a more passionate love.

The abuse of children has been the greatest scandal of our societies in the last century or so, and the Church has been as guilty as any other institution. We have been slow to deal with this, both in terms of helping the abused, and in not trying to handle these matters within the church. They were and are crimes, and must be dealt with by the police and courts like any other crime.

Finally, here in this place. Each priest over the centuries has come with new ideas and wanting to make a difference. It is not for me to say how that has been done, or not(!), by me, but we have concentrated on liturgy, on work with families with small children, on prayer, and on our links with other Christians, and I hope, by pastoral care for all who seek it. And as always, we seek to tell others of the love of God for them in Jesus Christ. That is the good news of the Gospel.



# Quiet Day

On Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> August there is the opportunity to take part in a Quiet Day – a day of reflection and 'time out'. The day will be held at St. Etheldreda's Church and church hall at Horley.

The subject for the day is the Psalms, and our relationship with Jesus Christ.

The structure of the day is as follows:

- 10.15 am: Arrival and coffee
- 10.30 am: First talk, followed by silence
- 12 noon: Mass in church, followed by picnic lunch.Please bring your own lunch. Drinks will be available for you to help yourself throughout the day.
- 1.30 pm: Second talk, followed by silence
- 3.00 pm: Final talk with prayer, followed by a cup of tea
- 4.00 pm: Departure



During the silences you are free to sit in and around the church and hall, and to use the space and quiet for your own reflections. If it is fine, you can walk around the village.


This is a day open to all! You do not need to come to church regularly to take part. Although there is structure, it is also a fairly relaxed day.

#### FABRIC WORKS UPDATE

By the time you receive this newsletter work on the chancel roof will have started, and the plan is for it to be completed by 31<sup>st</sup> October 2017. The start of this project was made possible due to the conservation professionals not noticing any bat activity on two separate evenings, one month apart, at dusk. Had there been evidence of bats breeding in the chancel roof then there would have been a considerable delay whilst those bats were re-located. So we say thank you to those bats for finding a better habitat elsewhere!



A professional survey has taken place on the stained glass windows and the metalwork around them. Once the report has been received then we will be able to determine how many we can manage to repair during the rest of this year.

The upgrade of the PA system has taken place and although we are still finding out how things work and what these new control knobs do there is no doubt that in due

course there will be a significant improvement noticed to the all round sound in the church. This will be of great benefit fir those coming into the church for weddings, baptisms, funerals as well as for acts of worship, and will also improve appreciation of music events held in the church.





Plans are in place to have a working party painting the woodwork with a special liquid to kill the woodworm. It is perhaps important to do this in the

summer months when it is easier to 'air' the church.

We have also a new hand rail at the entrance of the churchyard at the south-west corner from Church Avenue. This should enable greater access to the path round the Church, especially during the winter months.
