

October 4th is the feast of S Francis of Assisi. This cross dates from the 12th century, but it was in 1205 that Francis was praying before it in the Church of San Damiano and heard the words, "Francis, rebuild my church". At first Francis took that literally, for this church was in a poor state, but later understood that he was called to build up the spiritual church. Thus was founded the Franciscans.

The Cross is inspired by S John's Gospel. Christ is the central figure, a figure of light. "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (S John 8:12). He wears a crown of glory, not of thorns. He is shown alive, for he is Life, no longer dead. He is light and so radiant, overcoming the darkness. A king surrounded by scarlet. On his right are his mother and S John. On the left Mary Magdalen, another Mary, the centurion and the son whom Jesus had healed. In the outer corners are small figures of soldiers, near Jesus' hands are angels, beneath his feet pilgrims, representing us. The heavenly host is seen at the top of the cross and God the Father's hand reaches down to greet his son and he ascends triumphant over death.

This cross now hangs in S Clare's Church in Assisi.

Finally, a prayer of S Francis:

'Most high, glorious God, enlighten the darkness of my heart and give me, Lord, a correct faith, a certain hope, a perfect charity, sense and knowledge, so that I may carry out your holy and true command.'

The Revd Richard Coles

It was a cool but dry evening as people gathered in the garden at Lovells for drinks and canapés, admiring the new fountain and the lovely garden, and looking forward to the talk by Richard Coles. The church was almost full as he was introduced by Fr Roger. "This is someone who needs no introduction", he said and quickly handed over to our guest.

Richard spoke with his expected eloquence, humour and interest, talking a bit about "Strictly" but much more about his own life. His background was in the shoe industry of mid Northamptonshire, but he took himself off to London and got involved with pop music: a world of tours, hard work, fame, money. For him Christianity seemed an irrational fantasy, but then attending a service at S Alban's Holborn, he had an extraordinary experience; "I went in as a spectator but left as a participant". He studied theology at King's College, London, but then worked for the BBC for a number of years. Ordination came later and he is now Vicar of Finedon. But he has these two worlds: the rural ministry in Northamptonshire, but also the wider world through broadcasting and writing.

He was warmly applauded and people left very appreciative.

Bible Study - Mark's Gospel

This month we will start a series of six discussion sessions led by Roger Burne. We will be looking at some passages from St. Mark's Gospel. Starting at Advent (the beginning of the new church year), the Gospel readings on Sundays will come mainly from Mark. This is the shortest of the Gospels, as well as the first one to be written. The language is direct and urgent: it is easy to read right through in one go, and this is well worth doing before thinking about the individual passages.

These six sessions will be held on Tuesday mornings in the Church Room at 10.15am after Mass, and repeated on Wednesday evenings in Church at 7.30pm also after Mass. All are welcome to come in time for the Eucharist or just for the Bible Study sessions. Please bring a Bible in the translation of your own choice.


